EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

"Where is the infant King of the Jews?"

"We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage."

The Epiphany brings an almost magic atmosphere to the Christmas Feast, like a dark cloud fringed with light. Yet this light is not from that golden legend which Matthew has, perhaps, partially borrowed. This light shines out from a frail child - the Son of the Eternal Father, the Messiah of the Jews, God for the pagans and (as Herod was not) king of all peoples. How wonderfully God adapts his Christmas message to the capacity of his hearers! For the shepherds he uses a manger; for the Magi, a star; for the learned scribes, scripture; for Herod, the Wise Men from the East. The Wise Men symbolise for us the countless multitudes long exiled from paradise yet retaining some lingering, undefiled nostalgia for it. How many has a presentiment about this king of the Jews, born under a lucky star? Only the Magi undertook the journey and followed it through to the end. 'The heavens proclaim the glory of God' (Ps 18:2). Relying on their human wisdom, the Magi go first to Jerusalem, the centre of this Jewish mystery. In God's plan their learning must give way to the revealed scriptures, so that they might learn where the child was. Their dawning and already proven faith could then enter a final stage which will them to recognise the king of an invisible kingdom.

e who has a tongue does not get lost in the forest." Perhaps this Zambian proverb applied to the Magi as they arrived in Jerusalem and began looking for the king to whom the star was leading them. As they headed towards the palace, did they wonder why they were asking Herod about the birth of a new king, of whom he was unaware? A reigning monarch only wants to know about their own choice of successor. Surely the Magi realised that Herod wouldn't like their news and would lie about wanting to pay homage to the newborn king.

Perhaps the Magi knew more about stars and symbols than politics! They had done the right thing in asking where Jesus had been born but the wrong thing if they wanted to guarantee his safety. Their highly symbolic gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh were not the usual presents for a new baby – even for one who was a king. (An amusing cartoon suggests that their wives sneaked in afterwards and gave Mary and Joseph food and a bundle of nappies.)

As we celebrate the Epiphany, what could we offer the baby Jesus? It's easy to say that we bring ourselves and that in giving of ourselves we have given everything - but it's much more difficult in practice. It's so simple to make enthusiastic, grand gestures in the beginning and, little by little, chip away at the gift until there's not much left. Perhaps we could ask Jesus for the gift of perseverance?

Wedding invitations often ask for "presence" and not our "presents", a pun in which there is both generosity and wisdom. Isaiah describes the time of glorious light for God's people, telling of the gifts of gold and incense, which are there again at the manger, but these are secondary to the joy of the beloved's presence.

Church marriage courses ask young couples to think about "love language". How do they show love? Through action, touch, words or gifts

of time? At the heart of it is, of course, a loving presence in their lives together.

Being mindful and fully present with God in his created world, seeing him in the glory of creation, tending it with reverence, connecting with God through prayer and our human love of each other spending time in journeying towards him, as the Magi did. Perhaps these are the gifts we can offer.

Jubilee 2025

The Jubilee Churches

The Jubilee Churches are eleven churches in Rome which, in addition to the major basilicas, are to be gathering points for pilgrims, where various activities in a range of languages will help people deepen their understanding of the Holy Year. These churches will also offer pilgrims the chance to receive the sacrament of reconciliation and provide space for prayer.

The Jubilee Churches might be unfamiliar to many pilgrims, but they all offer a unique link to the history of the Church. St Prisca's, for example, is one of Rome's oldest sites of Christian worship and honours a martyr whom St Paul baptised at the age of 13. The sixteenth - century church of Santa Maria del Suffragio was built to pray for the souls of people who had died, whereas that of Santa Maria in Monserrato was a hospice for pilgrims who arrived in Rome and had nowhere

The Gospel for Sunday 5th January 2025 THE COMING OF THE MAGI

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. "Where is the infant king of the Jews?" they asked. "We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. "At Bethlehem in Judaea," they told him, "for this is what the prophet wrote: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel'." Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. "Go and find out all about the child," he said, "and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage." Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

The contrast is overwhelming: Herod, the King of the Jews, the nation prepared since all ages to welcome the coming of God to set all things right, fails to recognise the coming of the Lord. Herod is so blind as even to make every attempt to liquidate this child who heralds the completion of history and of Jewish hopes. By contrast the trio of wise men from the East, the traditional home of natural wisdom, show their conviction that the turning-point of history has arrived by journeying over desert and mountain to welcome and pay homage to the Lord. The evangelist is clear that this is the fulfilment of Isaiah's prophecy of the coming of peoples from the East to worship the Lord. Especially in eastern Christianity, the festival of the Epiphany (rather than the birthday of Jesus) is regarded as a celebration of the manifestation of Christ to the world. 'Manifestation' is the meaning of the Greek word 'Epiphany': it was first used of the public 'manifestation' of the Roman emperor on a state visit, for he was regarded as a deity to whom worship and adoration were due. What are we celebrating on this Feast of the Epiphany? Why is Epiphany a high point during the season of Christmas?

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 5th January 2025





1st Reading: Isaiah 60:1-6

The Glory of the Lord Has Risen upon You

Arise, shine out Jerusalem, for your light has come; the glory of the Lord is rising on you, though night still covers the earth and darkness the peoples. Above you the Lord now rises and above you his glory appears. The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness. Lift up your eyes and look round: all are assembling and coming towards you, your sons from far away and daughters being tenderly carried. At this sight you will grow radiant, your heart throbbing and full, since the riches of the sea will flow to you, the wealth of the nations come to you; camels in throngs will cover you, and dromedaries of Midian and Ephah; everyone in Sheba will come, bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord.

Many of the most glorious passages in the liturgy are taken from this third part of Isaiah, written after the return of Israel from captivity in Babylon. They are full of optimism and a new self-confidence. What is more, they show an awareness of Israel's mission to the world. This awareness had already been implied in God's promise to Abraham that 'all nations will bless themselves in him' - and is picked up by Mary in her Magnificat. But now there is a new understanding: God's choice of the people of Israel was not just for themselves, but so that they could bring light to all the nations. This is expressed in terms of the sunrise which suddenly brings light to a grey world. All the people need to do is simply to lift up their eyes and see the throngs of peoples eagerly coming from the remote deserts to draw salvation from Israel. How aware are we that our mission too is to bring light and salvation to a darkened world, that the message of God's love entrusted to us is given to us not only for ourselves but for all?

How do we (the Church, the people of God) bring the light of the Lord to all those around us?




2nd Reading: Ephesians 3:2-3. 5-6

The Climax of Creation

You have probably heard how I have been entrusted by God with the grace he meant for you, and that it was by a revelation that I was given the knowledge of the mystery. This mystery that has now been revealed through the Spirit to his holy apostles and prophets was unknown to any men in past generations; it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus, through the gospel.

The message of the Letter to the Ephesians is that the mystery hidden from the beginning of the ages has in Christ at last been revealed. In the first century there was great expectation of a defining and transforming event. In Christ this event had taken place. In his earlier letters Paul had already referred to it. Now two other dimensions have become clear. The division between Jews and gentiles is no longer valid, for in Christ all nations are summoned to the salvation promised to Abraham. This was only the completion of the promise that in Abraham all nations would bless themselves. Secondly, in Christ creation was brought to its completion. Just as all creation was created in Christ, the Word and Wisdom of the Father, just so all creation was summed up and brought to a head in Christ. As Christians we believe this, but to what extent do we live by it? Do we see all creatures, and especially all human creatures, as united with us and making sense only in Christ, even if they do not realise it? What confidence and joy this should give
