THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone more powerful than me, who will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire'

The evangelists introduce the public life of Jesus with his baptism by John the Baptist in the Jordan, in this way setting the tone for the whole of their accounts. After thirty years of hidden growth, here is a surprising happening, and one full of consequence. Here among the crowds of people called to repentance by John, Jesus undergoes an indescribable experience. The Precursor's baptism becomes for Jesus, the sinless One, a kind of door through which he passes in search of sinners. He will share in their lot and redirect towards God a creation, now, at last, on its true course. So, Jesus descends into the Jordan to 'do all that righteousness demands' (Mt 3:15). To this humble inauguration of a new and purified future, the very heavens open and reveal divine secrets. The Holy Spirit comes down on Jesus and a voice speaks: 'You are my Son'.....(Mark 1:11)' Jesus has always been the well-beloved of the Father, but today he finds himself established in his role as servant – like a new Isaac ready for sacrifice. Jesus will show himself to be truly the Son and Servant of his Father as, under the impulse of the Holy Spirit, he forms step by step a new and entirely filial humanity. 'There is a baptism I must still receive, and how great is my distress until it is over' (luke 12:50).

One in hope

sixteen and thirteen years ago, the baptisms of my children took place during Sunday Masses. The whole regular Sunday Mass congregations were witnesses to their baptisms: my children were immediately and physically united with the whole parish as baptised members of Christ's Church. We were all together as one community or as one body, one in prayer, one in faith and one in hope.

I am reminded of my daughter's and my son's baptisms by the fact that today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. The sense of "oneness" and community enters my mind when reading St Paul's words in today's second reading. There need be no sense of competition when it comes to salvation; through God's grace salvation is possible for all.

In the Gospel, people were baptised by John; then they were awakened to the realisation that Christ was still to come. When my daughter was baptised, she was asleep as I carried her in my arms to the font. She awoke, startled but silent, when the priest, who was standing right beside us and was not wearing a microphone, raised his voice while speaking so that everybody could hear. She awoke with a jolt, even as a little baby realising that something different was taking place. Her baptism involved a literal awakening.

One in hope, may our hearts be awakened today, that we may build one another up and support one another, as together we seek to attain the salvation made possible by Christ.

Jubilee 2025

Church of St Prisca

St Prisca's church in Rome is approximately one mile from the Mamertime Prison, where Ss Peter, Paul and other early Christians were held captive. Notorious for its terrible conditions, as elsewhere, prisoners depended on food supplied by people whom they knew "on the outside". Was Prisca, a first-century young martyr

whom, as a thirteen-year-old, St Paul apparently baptised, one of those who helped to bribe the guards and feed those who would soon die for their faith? We don't know. Concrete information about Prisca is hard to find, especially as her death is surrounded by legends of miraculous – and perhaps unlikely – events such

as the Coliseum lions refusing to attack her. People wanted to show that power and brutality can be overcome by gentleness – and so the stories appeared. It seems that Prisca was possibly tortured and eventually beheaded. The church of St Prisca is considered one of Rome's most important Christian sites – hence its choice as a Jubilee Church.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: 18-25 January

At least once a year, Christians are reminded of Jesus' prayer for his disciples that "they may be one so that the world may believe" (see John 17:21). Hearts are touched and Christians come together

to pray for their unity. Congregations and parishes all over the world exchange preachers or arrange special ecumenical celebrations and prayer services. The event that touches off this special experience is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Traditionally the week of prayer is celebrated between 18-25 January. In the southern hemisphere, where January is a vacation time, churches often find other days to celebrate it, for example around Pentecost, which is also a symbolic date for unity.

2025 marks the 1,700th anniversary of the first Christian Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea, near Constantinople, in AD 325. This commemoration provides a unique opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the common faith of Christians, as expressed in the creed formulated during this council.

Prayerfully preparing for Sunday Mass with special prayers for our school families

The Gospel for Sunday 12th January 2025 THE COMING OF THE SPIRIT

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, "I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire." Now when all the people had been baptised and while Jesus after his own baptism was at prayer, heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you."

Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Luke does not tell us who baptised Jesus. In Luke the story of John the Baptist ends with his promise of one who will baptise with the Holy Spirit - then John is arrested. At the baptism itself all Luke's concentration is on the coming of the Spirit. Indeed, it is hardly an account of the baptism at all, for the baptism is only a time marker for the coming of the Spirit when "Jesus, after his own baptism, was at prayer". Jesus' mission begins with the coming of the Spirit. In the same way, Luke's second volume (the Acts of the Apostles) begins with the coming of the Spirit at Pentecost. It is as though Luke wants to show the importance of the Spirit from beginning to end of the Christian life. And this is the case: in both books the part played by the Spirit directs all the action. The same is still true in the Christian community today, though sometimes human stubbornness and blindness does its best to impede the leadership and guidance of the Spirit. Most of us are artists at blocking the Spirit when the Spirit's promptings are inconvenient!

What does Luke's account of Jesus' baptism tell us about the Holy Spirit?


1st Reading: Isaiah 40:1-5. 9-11

Console my People, Console them

"Console my people, console them," says your God. "Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes." A voice cries, "Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear; say to the towns of Judah, "Here is your God." Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him; his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

The reading from Isaiah for today is the joyful song which opens the second part of Isaiah. After the 70 years of the Exile the people of Israel are looking forward to the return to Jerusalem, aware that they are soon to be released from their captivity. They have 'served their sentence' in Babylon and their sin has been forgiven. The Lord will lead them in joy across the great desert as he led them across the desert at Exodus, and will manifest his glory again. For Christians the excitement is that John the Baptist picks up this message as he prepares for the coming of Christ. We can see the fulfilment of this passage from Isaiah in the coming of Christ in history and in his future return in glory. Christ brings about his Kingship of God. but it is for us Christians, as we await his coming again, to show by our lives the glory and the love and the generosity of God to a world which refuses to see the splendour of his coming. This is the daunting responsibility of those who bear the name of 'Christian', who see in Jesus the manifestation of God's reign.

How today do we best manifest God's reign and fulfil our mission as Church?

2nd Reading: Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7

Reborn in the Cleansing Waters

God's grace has been revealed, and it has made salvation possible for the whole human race and taught us that what he have to do is give up everything that does not lead to God. and all our worldly ambitions; we must be self-restrained and live good and religious lives here in this present world, while we are waiting in hope for the blessing which will come with the Appearing of the glory of our great God and saviour Christ Jesus. He sacrificed himself for us in order to set us free from all wickedness and to purify a people so that it could be his very own and would have no ambition except to do good. When the kindness and love of God our saviour were revealed, it was not because he was concerned with any righteous actions we might have done ourselves; it was for no reason except his own compassion that he saved us, by means of the cleansing water of rebirth and by renewing us with the Holy Spirit which he has so generously poured over us through Jesus Christ our saviour. He did this so that we should be justified by his grace, to become heirs looking forward to inheriting eternal life.

The phrase in this reading which seizes the attention is "he saved us, by means of the cleansing water of rebirth and by renewing us with the Holy Spirit". Is this referring to Jesus' baptism or to yours and mine? My guess is that in the original letter it referred to our baptism, but that, by putting it forward on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, the Church is referring it to Jesus' baptism as the model of your and my baptism. We received in our baptism the same re-birth as children of God and the same renewal in the Holy Spirit as Jesus did in the Jordan. The image of birth from the waters is a fascinating one, and can be taken on many levels; the ocean as the great, turbulent place from which all life derives, the source of life and fertility for plants, animals and humans, the 'waters' of each mammal's birth. By the waters of baptism we are given a wholly new life as adopted sons of God. We have seen how, in Luke's account of the Baptism of Jesus, the coming of the Spirit is the main focus. On us too the Spirit comes at baptism and empowers us to do all kinds of good works beyond any human ability.

How do we see the Holy Spirit at work in our own particular local Church community?

This means they feel happy and safe...The curriculum is ambitious and well structured...Adults have secure subject knowledge...Leaders have high expectations and are ambitious for pupils...Safeguarding is a priority here.' (OFSTED Inspection, November 2023).

'A. Classroom religious education is outstanding

 The school has adapted and developed the themes of the Religious Education Curriculum Directory in an excellent manner to meet the learning needs of the pupils' of St Mary's.

- The religious education programme in use fully delivers this content and the use of De Bono system in religious education pushes pupils to develop their understanding further.
- After carefully analysing the needs of their pupils, the school has developed a curriculum and teaching programme that has reached outstanding achievement by the pupils in religious education.
- Teachers have high expectations and plan lessons that deepen pupils' religious literacy.
- Since the last inspection, staff confidence in recording and assessment has been demonstrably achieved with the evidence of the clarity and confidence on the part of the staff in planning imaginative lessons based on the religious education programme followed in the school.
- The headteacher is also the religious education curriculum coordinator and she takes
 the closest interest in developing the excellent teaching and learning of religious
 education in the school.
- The chair of governors is a recent appointment but with her years of experience on the governing body she is clear in her role of both support and challenge in pursuing the special responsibility of governors of a Catholic school.

B. The Catholic life of the school is outstanding

 The curriculum fully conforms to the classroom curriculum time of at least 10% for religious education and teaching is fully in line with the requirements of the Bishops' Conference. ********************************

- The previous inspection asked the school to develop pupils' understanding of Catholic Social Teaching and to help pupils understand the ethics of the market place and fair trade. The school has fully addressed these priorities, both in their classroom teaching and in the encouragement offered when choosing charities to support.
- The pupils of St Mary's enjoy an outstanding experience of prayer, liturgy and Catholic worship.
- Pupils and staff have a deep understanding of the call to 'human flourishing' and are given opportunities to develop and celebrate their gifts and talents.
- Partnership with the parents is excellent; they appreciate and support all that the school provides for their children.
- The leadership and management of the school are very effective in promoting the Catholic life of the school. The head is strong and devoted in providing both oversight and support on all aspects of Catholic life. The contribution and regular visits of the parish priest provides a strong and stable reinforcement of the foundational position of Catholicism in the life of the school'
