33rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened the stars will fall from heaven, they will see the Son of Man coming with power"

What family has not experienced in dramatic circumstances, say in time of war, that anxious feeling of suspense awaiting the return of a loved one? For a long time they had been without news of him. One day he arrives out of the blue; suddenly, maybe at night-time, he is there. He knocks at the door, at the window, and they hurry to let him in. after the first joyous raptures of reunion, each one celebrates his homecoming by showing him what they have prepared in expectation of the great day. So often they had asked themselves: "When and how will he come?" When and how; two questions that the first generation of Christians never ceased to raise in connection with the return of Christ. Already, apropos of the destruction of the Temple, considered as a divine judgement and as the destruction of a world, the disciples questioned Jesus: 'Tell us, when is this going to happen, and what sign will there be that all of this is about to be fulfilled?' (Mark 13:4). After the ascension and the beginning of the first persecutions, they returned to the words of the Lord, setting them beside certain oracles of the scriptures. When will the Son of Man come? As the basket of fruits in summer signified for Amos (Amos 8:1-2) that the end was near, so, for the evangelist the fig tree indicates the end is near.

Hidden heroes

he hidden heroes within prison walls sow seeds of hope each day. Life inside the little village of the prison is as varied and complex as any small community. Every moment is rich in opportunities to respond to the needs of others and affect the lives of others.

Is your local community a model of peace and harmony among all people?

Does everyone have everyone else's best intentions at heart?

Those who bring peace, harmony and the best intentions to a prison environment are building a restorative and rehabilitative environment which heals wounds, changes lives and potentially saves others: wing staff making the time to really listen and respond; mental health nurses providing gentle, clinical support; teachers addressing the needs of those whom an education system has failed; drug workers walking patiently with those plagued by addiction... All care and nurture like any good gardener.

Chaplains also walk alongside people, supporting staff and inmates in a myriad of ways. As the fig tree needs good soil in which to flourish, so those in the prison community need an environment that provides support and sustenance. Through presence, patience, persistence and prayer, chaplains till the ground around them. It can be very poor soil.

Feast of the week Sunday 23 November

Bl. Miguel Agustín Pro (1891-1927)

"If I meet any long-faced saints in heaven, I will cheer them up with a Mexican hat dance!"

Blessed Miguel Pro SJ joined the Jesuits in Mexico in 1911 and was ordained a priest on 31 August 1925. Known for his infectious humour, ingenuity and acting ability, Mexico's anticlerical laws forced Miguel to practise his ministry secretly and in disguise – but so successfully that he was eventually arrested and sentenced to death by firing squad on 23 November 1927. Miguel refused the blindfold and addressed his executioners, saying, "May God

have mercy on you. May God bless you! Lord, you know I am innocent! With all my heart I forgive my enemies." He then raised his arms, making of himself a crucifix, and shouted out, "Viva Cristo Rey!" (Long live Christ the King!)

The government published many photographs of Miguel's death, hoping – but failing – to intimidate Catholics, who venerated them as relics.

40,000 people accompanied his funeral procession whilst another 20,000 waited at the cemetery.

A Church that sows hope is young: a prophetic Church that, by her presence, says to the broken-hearted and the outcast of the world, "Take heart, the Lord is near. For you too, summer is being born in the depths of winter. From your pain, hope can arise". Brothers and sisters, let us bring this outlook of hope to our world.

The Gospel for Sunday 17th November 2024 THE COMING OF THE SON OF MAN

Jesus said to his disciples, "In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven. Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you, when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father."

Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

Jesus saw his mission to be the establishment of the sovereignty of God, the kingship and rule of God over the world, including over our rebellious human hearts. Using the language and imagery of his time, he described this 'earth-shaking' event in terms of cosmic disturbances. The coming of God, the Day of the Lord, would constitute the end of the world as we know it. As Christians we must acknowledge that the death and resurrection of Christ utterly changed the world for ever; it was the Day of the Lord. And yet the world still continues, and we have still to prepare for a future Day of the Lord, when we will come into that awesome presence. That meeting is pictured in terms of collapse and upheaval, our world turned upside down. At death all our familiar realities cease, even the ticking of the clock; at death, time ceases to have meaning. We do not know, and have no need to know, when or how this will occur. For all, it will come; everyone will meet the Lord, but will we meet Him all together or individually? The Son of Man will gather his own, in great power and glory. What does this reading have to teach us about the coming of the Son of Man? Is it something we should be afraid of? How do we best prepare for that Day?



1st Reading: Daniel 12:1-3

The Resurrection of the Dead

At that time Michael will stand up, the great prince who mounts guard over your people. There is going to be a time of great distress, unparalleled since nations first came into existence. When that time comes, your own people will be spared, all those whose names are found written in the Book. Of those who lie sleeping in the dust of the earth many will awake, some to everlasting life, some to shame and everlasting disgrace. The learned will shine as brightly as the vault of heaven, and those who have instructed many in virtue, as bright as stars for all eternity.

We are coming towards the end of the Church's year. This passage looks towards the end of all things. It is a crucial passage, for here, for the first time in the Bible, the resurrection of the dead is proclaimed. The Book of Daniel was written during a great persecution of the Jews, a couple of centuries before Christ, Texts, like this in the prophet Daniel, speak clearly of the resurrection of those who remain true to the Lord. The earlier Israelites pictured the after-life as a sort of powerless, shadowy half-existence known as Sheol, where the dead could not even praise God. Yet there had also been many hints of conviction that God would never desert those who love him: 'I know that my Redeemer lives, and that from my flesh I will look on God,' said Job. Only now in the Book of Daniel, under the stress of the death of martyrs in the persecution, is the full truth revealed: at the end of time God will intervene to draw his own to himself in fullness of life. In this reading 'many will awaken' does not mean that some will not awaken; it merely indicates a vast number, the almost limitless multitude of the dead.

Martyrs witness to the life of the Lord and the truth of His resurrection: which martyrs do you admire most?



2nd Reading: Hebrews 10:11-14. 18

One Single Sacrifice

All the priests stand at their duties every day, offering over and over again the same sacrifices which are quite incapable of taking sins away. Christ, on the other hand, has offered one single sacrifice for sins, and then taken his place for ever, at the right hand of God, where he is now waiting until his enemies are made into a footstool for him. By virtue of that one single offering, he has achieved the eternal perfection of all whom he is sanctifying. When all sins have been forgiven, there can be no more sin offerings.

In this, our last reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, Christ is pictured (in the terms of the coronation song, Psalm 110) as the Son of God, sharing God's throne. His sacrifice on the Cross was not an act of vengeance by God, inflicting on Jesus the pains which we deserve, then suddenly changing his mind and rehabilitating his Son. No, it was the consummate act of loving obedience, by which Jesus, on behalf of all humanity, reversed the disobedience of Adam and united us all to God. The resurrection - by which Christ was raised to glory, the Son of God in power - was God's action by which this renewal of life occurred. The sacrifices of the Old Law were partial, temporary and needed to be repeated. Christ's offering in obedience was complete, and could never be repeated. Writing to the Corinthians Paul uses the same psalm to show that Christ is waiting to put the last great enemy. Death, under his feet, and so present the Kingdom to His Father. This is the glorious awakening which is described in the first reading from Daniel.

How does this reading from the Letter to the Hebrews enrich our understanding of the Resurrection?
