# SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

'People generally serve the best wine first and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty; you have kept the best till now.'
Invited to Cana with his mother, Jesus came there as a friend, a neighbour,

accompanied by his disciples. Did he know that he would start there, at the wedding, 'the first of the signs' to be given by him? For St John who opened the prologue of his gospel: 'In the beginning was the Word', the 'first of the signs' expresses the eternal glory of Jesus in time. The evangelist tells us of this sign that we may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and so believing have life in his name (John 20:30-31). It was not a chance happening that this village wedding occurred at the beginning of Jesus' public life. God in him had wedded humanity to himself: that is the good news, even if the guests who are present are unaware that the Son of God has sat at their table, and that he is the true bridegroom. The whole mystery of Cana turns on the presence of this bridegroom who is beginning to reveal himself. It is Jesus, in fact, who, unknown to the steward of the feast, had 'kept the good wine until now'. Wine is the drink at weddings, at once the fruit of the vine and of man's work. The earth had soaked up the sun, bringing forth the fruit of a whole year's work for the vinedresser. Drawn from the jars intended for ritual ablutions. the wine of Cana could not have been inferior.

# Bountiful generosity

The story of the wedding feast at Cana is so familiar to most of us that we can be at risk of glossing over it. We hear the words of a miracle taking place and of Mary prompting her son into action. But maybe we see this in a different time or for other people. Sometimes we miss the most important part of this miracle - the sheer generosity of God. There were

six stone water jars holding up to thirty gallons each. Jesus created what today would be 900 bottles of wine! Can you imagine holding a party and having 900 bottles of wine? It would be completely over the top! Yet this is God's creative and redeeming power, a power that is so over the top it provides everything we need and a love that has no end. And this is what is at the heart of a Jubilee Year, where faith, hope and love abound.

Neil Foley is from Wexford, Ireland, where he lives with his wife, Helen, and twin girls, Zélie and Martha. He works full-time as an environmental scientist but is also a lay missionary with the Redemptorists, a retreat facilitator and a

recently officiated at the wedding of a young couple who felt they somehow knew me better than they knew the new parish priest. I readily obliged and the service went exactly as planned. The trouble started at the reception when, after much wine had been consumed, a fight broke out involving several people from both families and was only stopped when the mothers of the bride and groom stood on a table together and screamed for quiet. In the silence that followed, they jauntily descended and ordered drinks for evervone.

The danger at this wedding was not that the group were running out of wine but some guests were running out of respect and courtesy. This was reversed, thanks to the authority of two brave mothers. At the wedding feast in Cana, it is the authority of the mother of Jesus that leads towards the solution of the lack of wine when she instructs the servants: "Do whatever he tells you." The steward is astonished at the quality of the water turned into wine - not the plonk you might suspect to be served at this point, but gallons of the choicest wine.

This illustrates a beautiful point in John's Prologue: "From his fulness we have all received, grace upon grace." That includes all of us.

# The Gospel for Sunday 19th January 2025 THE WEDDING-FEAST AT CANA

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." Jesus said, "Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water," and they filled them to the brim. "Draw some out now," he told them, "and take it to the steward." They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from – only the servants who had drawn the water knew - the steward called the bridegroom and said, "People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink; but you have kept the best wine till now." This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.

#### Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

# After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Year C is the year of Luke's gospel, but we start with this reading from John which recounts the symbolic beginning of Jesus' ministry. It is full of riches. After the first reading from Isaiah it is impossible not to see this 'sign' (as John calls it) as a sign of that final wedding-feast of God and his people. Furthermore, in Jewish thought, water represents the Law: in an arid land water is the sign of life and is precious – just so, the Law of God is precious and gives life. Jesus transforms this water of the Law into the wine of the New Covenant – and in such generous quantities: over one hundred gallons of wine! Then there is Mary's part: Jesus says his Hour has not yet come (and the reader knows that the Hour of Jesus will be the moment of his exaltation at the Cross and Resurrection), but Mary's confident plea is a reminder to us of the power of her intercession. She will be mentioned no more in this gospel till she is present at the Cross, sharing the passion of her Son and joined to the Beloved Disciple to form the first Christian community.

Why did Jesus choose to do this as his first miracle?

1st Reading: Isaiah 62:1-5

# The Wedding-Feast of the Lord

About Zion I will not be silent; about Jerusalem I will not grow weary, until her integrity shines out like the dawn and her salvation flames like a torch. The nations then will see your integrity, all the kings your glory, and you will be called by a new name, one which the mouth of the Lord will confer. You are to be a crown of splendour in the hand of the Lord, a princely diadem in the hand of your God; no longer are you to be named 'Forsaken', nor your land 'Abandoned', but you shall be called 'My Delight' and your land 'The Wedded'; for the Lord takes delight in you and your land will have its wedding. Like a young man marrying a virgin, so will the one who built you wed you, and as the bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so will your God rejoice in you.

The marriage relationship is perhaps the most intimate of the personal relationships we know, designed to become ever deeper and more absorbing. Even the relationship of mother to child cannot equal it. So in the Bible the relationship of the Lord to his people is likened to the relationship in marriage. But, like many human marriage relationships, it went through bad patches. Israel was so persistently unfaithful to the Lord that eventually it seemed that the Lord abandoned her to those with whom she had 'prostituted' herself. This could not be permanent; Israel could not go on being called 'Abandoned' and 'Forsaken'; the past would be forgotten. After the return of Israel from exile in Babylon, Isaiah prophesies the final wedding in terms of the unalloyed joy of a freshly wedded couple. So in the gospels, Jesus uses the figure of the final wedding-feast, and the image of himself as the bridegroom in the joy of the festival. The Lord always gives us another chance, an unalloyed welcome to his feast.

What does it mean to liken our relationship with God to the relationship between a couple in marriage?

I can rejoice in gifts which God has given to me, but only if simultaneously I think of all the gifts which others have and I lack. 2

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

# Gifts of the Spirit

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. One may have the gift of preaching with wisdom given him by the Spirit; another may have the gift of preaching instruction given him by the same Spirit; and another the gift of faith given by the same Spirit; another again the gift of healing, through this one Spirit; one, the power of miracles; another, prophecy; another the gift of recognising spirits; another the gift of tongues and another the ability to interpret them. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses.

At the beginning of each year the Church gives us some six Sundays of readings from Paul's first letter to that troubled community, the Corinthians. Corinth was a thriving port-town of southern Greece, with a very varied community, rich and poor, academics and dockers. There were no clear human leaders in the Church community, and reliance on the Spirit for guidance in the problems of living as Christians did not always seem to provide a solution. The readings on these three Sundays show Paul trying to help. Yes, the Spirit is at work in the community in many different ways. There are many different gifts, all necessary for this varied community. The trouble seems to have been that each person valued their own contribution so much that the gifts of others seemed insignificant. Paul's stress on the variety of ways in which the Spirit works to build up a community gives us the occasion to reflect on the variety of gifts which the Spirit has poured out on our own Christian community, and on every individual member of it. I can rejoice in gifts which God has given to me, but only if simultaneously I think of all the gifts which others have and I lack.

What gifts do we need in a Christian community for its full flourishing under God? How do we help all in the community realise the diversity of gifts?

The journey takes approximately two and a half hours, so sit back and relax and enjoy the beautiful panoramic view of the countryside and the Adriatic Sea. If time permits, we celebrate Mass in Vepric Holy Shrine - a small Shrine dedicated to Our Lady of Lourdes, or St Peter's church in Slano (depending on which airport we are arriving at). Continue our journey to Medjugorje and then dinner at the hotel.

# Day 2, Wednesday 30th April

### Medjugorje - Apparition Hill

After breakfast, we meet with our guide and walk to St James Church where we will have our concelebrated Mass in English. Afterwards, we will have a guided walking tour of the Sanctuary and the surrounding area. We will have lunch and afterwards we go to the Apparition Hill where our guide will explain all the information you long to hear on Our Blessed Mother's Apparitions. On our way down, we visit Vicka's old family house. She is one of the 6 visionaries and received many apparitions during her years here. Evening dinner at the hotel.

# Day 3, Thursday 1st May

# Medjugorje - Free day

Breakfast at the hotel. At 10am we attend concelebrated Mass in English at St James church. Special Note: Please note that there are many Spiritual activities in Medjugorje and around the Sanctuary you can attend daily. Confessions are conducted throughout the day in many languages (Medjugorje is well known for this). Talks from one of the visionaries could be arranged if they are available, Divine Mercy Prayer at 3pm will be in St James church, visit Risen Christ located at the back of the church and pray the Stations of the Cross here if you wish. We can also revisit the Apparition Hill and the Blue Cross where many of Our Lady's apparitions and healings have taken place. Daily Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament is held at the open altar at the back of the church (we can attend this daily). There are many restaurants to choose from, all very reasonably priced as well as shops to browse through. Evening dinner at the hotel.

# Day 4, Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> May

# Medjugorje - Mt Krizevac - Cross Mountain

After breakfast, we meet with our guide at the hotel and we walk to the foot of Mount Krizevac or take a taxi (cost not included £2 each way based on 4 people in a taxi), a kilometre away from the church and 520 metres above sea level. We pray the Stations of the Cross on the way up to the mountain. Please note that to go up the mountain you must be reasonably fit and be very careful as the mountain has rough rocks and stones to tackle. The Gigantic Cross you see up here was erected by local people in 1933 to commemorate the 1900th anniversary of our Jesus' Crucifixion. Enjoy the view at the summit and relax before the descent. You can choose to walk or take a taxi back to the hotel. To participate in daily activities in the Sanctuary please read Day 3. Evening dinner at the hotel.

# Day 5, Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> May

# Medjugorje - Mostar

Breakfast at the hotel. Today we explore outside Medjugorje and visit the Old City of Mostar, a Medieval City. The highlight is the famous Old Bridge of Mostar built in the 17th century and sadly destroyed during the Bosnia and Herzegovina war between 1992 and 1995. It is now being restored to is its former glory. We celebrate Mass in St Paul/Peter church here. We stay here for the rest of the day we have lunch and do some shopping here (there are plenty of things you can buy here). Evening dinner at the hotel.

# Day 6, Sunday 4th May

# Medjugorje - Surmanci

At 10am we attend concelebrated Mass in English at St James church. After lunch, we drive to the village of Surmanci where we celebrate Mass in the Church of the Merciful Jesus. In the church there is a miraculous icon of Jesus of Mercy. This icon was in the Sanctuary of Divine Mercy in Trento where Ugo Festa was miraculously healed when he prayed before it. It also has a small relic of St Faustina. We return to Medjugorje and have lunch here. Free for the remainder of the day. Evening dinner at the hotel.

# Day 7, Monday 5th May

# Medjugorje - Cenacolo

Breakfast at the hotel. Mass at 10am in St James Church. Free time for the rest of morning and after lunch visit the community of Cenacolo. This was founded by Sister Elvera Petrozzi in 1991 to support young people recovering from addictions and to teach them the simple way of life, with faith in Jesus, and to straighten their paths in life. Taxi to Cenacolo not included approximately £2 each way (4 people sharing). Return to the hotel and evening dinner.

# Day 8, Tuesday 6th May

# Medjugorje - Free day

Breakfast at the hotel. At 10am we attend concelebrated Mass in English at St James church. Free day for the rest of the day. Dinner at the hotel and your last night in Medjugorje.

# Day 9, Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> May

### Medjugorje – UK

After breakfast, we check-out of the hotel and leave Medjugorje. Proceed to the airport for our flight back to the UK. Depending on the flight time, we may be able to celebrate Mass in Slano or at Vepric Shrine beforehand.

Note: evening dinner is your first meal on the day we arrive, breakfast is your last meal on the day we leave. Itinerary is subject to change. E&OE.
