THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

'The spirit of the Lord has been given to me for he has anointed me'
(Of the Word of God)

'The gospel of Jesus Christ according to Luke'

To understand what this means, we must realise that a gospel is not just a collection of anecdotes about Jesus and his teaching. Each evangelist is a witness to the Son of God. He sets himself to answer the question confronting everyone to whom it has been given to meet Jesus, either by hearing someone speak of Him, or by discovering Him in the life of one of His followers: 'Who are you Lord?' each of these witnesses relates his faith in Jesus in the form of a story - that of the doings and words of Jesus - expressed in relation in relation to his own experience and background. This explains the originality of each evangelist, each having his own emphasis, his own way of presenting the mystery of Christ and his teaching. For all that, there is only one gospel, because there is only one Christ, to whom we are sent by all the scriptures....It happened in Nazara, in the synagogue, that one day it was Jesus' to Jesus to comment on the reading from the Law, giving with it a text from the prophets. His choice fell on a text from Isaiah – he does not discuss it, he simply declares: 'This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen': he, in whom all the promises of God have found their 'yes' (2Cor 1:20)

Mission of hope

n the hot summer night of 18 July in the year AD 64. a fire broke out in the arcade of shops surrounding the Circus Maximus, Rome's chariot stadium. The flames raged for nine days before they came under control. After the desolation, two-thirds of the imperial city lay in

When the fire began, the emperor Nero was miles away, at the cooler coastal resort at Anzio. Well aware of his growing unpopularity among the people and the rumours spread by the surviving

homeless that he started the fire, Nero sought to divert suspicion away from himself, so he looked for victims to blame. Thus began the first great persecution of Christians. The two principal apostles of the emerging church, Peter and Paul, were martyred in this persecution.

While the Church was adapting to its illegal status within the Roman Empire, the first great

defence of Christianity was written - the two-volume work of

the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. As we hear in today's Gospel, Luke dedicates his defence to an unknown high Roman official, his excellency Theophilus. Luke will defend Christianity against the accusations of the Romans.

Luke will portray the founder of Christianity as a figure of nobility, grace and charm; a man who breathed kindliness and graciousness. Luke will show that Jesus and his followers were found innocent by the representatives of the Roman law: Pilate declares three times that Jesus is innocent of the charges brought against him. As you listen to Luke's Gospel this year, listen to his great defence of Christianity against the charge of the Roman authorities.

On the margins

Jesus teaches us to care for those on the margins of society - in his time, the poor, the sick and the despised. He reached out to these people with his love.

Who are the marginalised in twenty-first-century Britain?

Those in loving families and caring communities can thrive at the centre of a phalanx of love, knowing what it is to be valued and needed. Without these vital elements of life, we are vulnerable to despair. Mother Teresa said that the worst human disease, far worse than poverty, was loneliness.

The migrant worker, far from home, may feel at the margins of our society. So, too, may the young person emerging from the care system, with neither family nor community to protect them or to guide them into meaningful occupation.

Thankfully, none of us is outside the reach of God's love. But if we lack the warmth of human compassion at the centre of our lives, we know what it is to be marginalised.

The Gospel for Sunday 26th January 2025 JESUS PROCLAIMS HIS MESSAGE

Seeing that many others have undertaken to draw up accounts of the events that have taken place among us, exactly as these were handed down to us by those who from the outset were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word, I in my turn, after carefully going over the whole story from the beginning, have decided to write an ordered account for you, Theophilus, so that your Excellency may learn how well founded the teaching is that you have received. Jesus, with the power of the Spirit in him, returned to Galilee; and his reputation spread throughout the countryside. He taught in their synagogues and everyone praised him. He came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and went into the synagogue on the sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read, and they handed him the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll he found a place where it is written: The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour. He then rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the assistant and sat down. And all eyes in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to speak to them, "This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen."

Reflect

After reading the Gospel, did any words stand out? If they did, ponder or discuss them before proceeding with the reflection.

After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Today's gospel passage starts the series of readings from Luke which will continue throughout the ordinary Sundays of the Year. It is composed of two separate passages: first it gives Luke's introduction to his gospel, in which he explains how and why he wrote it. Then, jumping over the preparatory stories of Jesus' infancy, baptism and testing in the desert, it comes directly to his programmatic manifesto in the synagogue at Nazareth. The gospel is offered to Theophilus – a Greek name – and is written for gentile communities. So Luke stresses that Jesus' message is not just for Jews but for the peoples of the whole world. Twice in the second passage (Jesus' manifesto in Nazareth) Luke stresses that Jesus is moved by the Spirit of the Lord. As we see in the second reading, the Spirit was obviously at work in the early Christian communities. This was no more than a continuation of the Spirit's activity from the very beginning of the Christian movement. In Luke's stories of the annunciation, birth and infancy of Jesus the presence of the Spirit is constantly noted. In the earliest stories of the Church in the Acts of the Apostles the same guidance by the Spirit directs every move. Why did Jesus choose to read this passage from the scriptures?

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 26th January 2025





1st Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-6. 8-10

Ezra Reads from the Law

Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, consisting of men, women, and children old enough to understand. This was the first day of the seventh month. On the square before the Water Gate, in the presence of the men and women, and children old enough to understand, he read from the book from early morning till noon; all the people listened attentively to the Book of the Law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden dais erected for the purpose. In full view of all the people - since he stood higher than all the people - Ezra opened the book; and when he opened it all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people raised their hands and answered, "Amen! Amen!"; then they bowed down and, face to the ground, prostrated themselves before the Lord. And Ezra read from the Law of God, translating and giving the sense, so that the people understood what was read. Then Nehemiah - His Excellency - and Ezra, priest and scribe (and the Levites who were instructing the people) said to all the people, "This day is sacred to the Lord your God. Do not be mournful; do not weep." For the people were all in tears as they listened to the words of the Law. He then said, "Go, eat the fat, drink the sweet wine, and send a portion to the man who has nothing prepared ready. For this day is sacred to our Lord. Do not be sad: the joy of the Lord is your stronghold."

The Book of Nehemiah, from which today's reading is taken, is the latest historical book of the Hebrew Bible. It describes the re-establishment of the People of Israel, now the Jews, in and around Jerusalem, on their release from exile in Babylon. In the seventy years of exile they had developed a way of life based on the Law and marked by Sabbath, circumcision and ritual food; this distinguished them not only from the Babylonians, but also from those inhabitants of Judaea who had not been dragged into captivity. It was only those who were passionate for the Lord and this way of life who returned to the ruins of Jerusalem. Others stayed in more comfortable exile! Ezra, the expert in the Law, and Nehemiah, commissioned by the King of Persia (in whose empire Judaea lay), were at different times leaders of the community. In this scene Ezra reads out and so promulgates the Law in Jerusalem, to the acclaim of the people. What a contrast to the scene in the synagogue at Nazareth where Jesus reads out the passage from Isaiah (the clue to his way of life and that of his followers) - only to be rejected by his own people!

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What does this reading from Nehemiah have to say to us about the importance of God's word?



2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-14. 27

The Body of Christ

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink. Nor is the body to be identified with any one of its many parts. Now you together are Christ's body; but each of you is a different part of it.

Following directly on from last Sunday's reading, Paul (in today's passage) shows just why the different gifts of the Spirit must be used for the common purpose of building up the community. He compares the community which lives with the life of the Spirit to a human body. For the effective functioning of the human body each highly diverse organ must play its part, contribute its own particular speciality. To prevent the individual Corinthians becoming proud and possessive of their own particular gifts, Paul stresses that, like parts of the body, none is more important than any other. Is it less serious if your liver fails or your kidneys? This comparison of a community to a human body is common in ancient literature, but nowhere else is the community as a body described as the body of a particular person in the way that Paul designates the Corinthian Christian community as the Body of Christ. The Body which lives by the life-principle of Christ's Spirit is Christ's own Body.

What makes the Body of Christ so different from any other body?
